I am very grateful for the opportunities the Margolis Center has provided to me. Throughout the past school year and this summer I have had the privilege of working on a research team drafting recommendations for North Carolina on how to best implement the recently published goals outlined in the NC Early Childhood Action Plan. Through hands-on qualitative research, I have learned so much about both how to conduct qualitative research and the policy levers needed to implement state-wide programs.
