Kumbie Madondo, PhD, Director, Community Partnerships & Policy Solutions (CPPS) at the New York Academy of Medicine (NYAM) is interested in research focused on improving the health of communities of color, as well as low income and marginalized populations. She is particularly interested in using social network analysis to assess the types and quality of relationships among organizations that promote health equity. Current projects include a four-year National Institutes of Health (NIH) funded project examining organizational-level factors that drive the implementation and dissemination of food policies and programs across different neighborhoods in New York City. Completed projects include a contract with the New York City Department of Health to conduct a network analysis of 39 community-based organizations addressing community health priorities in neighborhoods facing significant health disparities in New York City. Dr. Madondo was also recently the project director for New York City on a European Commission Horizon 2020-funded project examining asthma and diabetes in five European and U.S. cities (Barcelona, Birmingham, Paris, New York City and Singapore). Prior to joining NYAM she evaluated strategies used by community-based organizations (CBOs) to facilitate insurance enrollment under the Affordable Care Act and was the principal investigator for a large-scale Centers for Disease Control and Prevention-funded evaluation that focused on HIV/AIDS prevention among African American and Latino populations. Dr. Madondo has coauthored Project ECHO® Evaluation 101: A Practical Guide for Evaluating your Program (2017) and the Kellogg's Foundation Step-by-Step Guide to Evaluation: How to Become Savvy Evaluation Consumers (2017). She earned her PhD in sociology from Virginia Tech University.
