Program Overview

The mission of Duke University's Robert J. 
Summer 2022 Interns

Students are working closely with their mentors on research projects focusing on aspects of: Health Care Transformation, Biomedical Innovation, Global Health, and Education. Through the remote internship program, interns are gaining experience in qualitative and quantitative research; receiving training and coaching on research skills/presentations/writing skills; participating in Margolis Seminars, Summer Research Symposium, Journal Club; and are building relationships with their peers through virtual socials and team projects.


Amanda He


Breanna Barrett
